# FROM THE PASTOR

The Justice of God

*Yet you say 'the way of the Lord is not just' O house of Israel, I will judge each of you according to his ways. Ezekiel 33:20*

Is God just? Sometimes it sure is hard to think that he is. Life rarely seems to feel fair. We are blamed for things we do not do, and face consequences that stem from the actions of others. We see criminals go free, and innocent people suffering. It would be easy to claim that God is not just while looking at the world around us.

Ezekiel had to deal with this question from the Israelites. This book was written while the Israelites were in Babylon, in exile. Jerusalem had been conquered and the people carried off to a foreign land. This did not seem fair, this did not seem just. Yes the people of Jerusalem were unfaithful, but so were their fathers. Yet their fathers did not get punished with Babylon! Yes the people of Jerusalem were unfaithful, but it was because of the rulers. Why was God punishing people for the actions of their leaders? That was the question that people were asking.

So how does God answer their questions? He turns the question back on them. He told them that he was going to judge each man according to his own deeds- and that is how he always has operated. Yes, their fathers sinned and Babylon did not come. But that does not mean God never approached their fathers. He approached them with prophets warning of the destruction that was coming if they continued in their ways. Yet instead of repenting and turning from their ways the people continued sinning. Therefore, God sent his justice through Babylon just as he said he would. But Babylon would not be the end of the story- God was going to restore the people as well and bring them back home. Not because the people were so great, but because God chose too.

In truth each of us deserve Babylon. Each of us deserve the justice of God to come in terms of destruction. But God chooses to hold back on the destruction, and to give mercy instead. Jesus is going to come in Justice, but before that time arrives he already comes to us. He comes to us through his word warning of the justice to come. The Word of God tells us to turn from our sinful ways, and return to him. He will be merciful to all who confess their sins and ask for forgiveness.

We cannot claim that our God is inconsistent. If the people of Jerusalem had heeded the warnings of the prophets he would have been merciful and not sent Babylon. If we repent today he will be merciful and we will be able to go to our heavenly home. Our God is indeed a just God and he will judge each person by his deeds. The question we need to ask ourselves is this. Do we want our deeds to stand out on their own, or do we want our deeds joined together with the deeds of Christ who lived the perfect life? For indeed if in baptism we have been joined with Christ then we are innocent, for he lived the perfect life on our behalf. We do not need to fear the wrath of God, for we have been made perfect and innocent through the death and resurrection of his son Jesus Christ. Now having received mercy let us continue bringing God's justice to this world by connecting people to Jesus.
